



JEREMY BATES

- Born 19 June, 1962 in Solihull, UK
- Ranked Number 1 in Great Britain from 1988-1995
- Won the mixed doubles at Wimbledon in 1987 and at the Australian Open in 1991, both with Jo Durie
- Reached the Australian Open doubles final with Peter Lundgren in 1988
- In 1982 turned in best showing by a British player at Wimbledon since Buster Mottram to date by reaching the round of 16
- Won first career ATP Tour singles title at Seoul in 1994 and was the oldest winner on the tour that year as well as becoming the first Brit to win a tournament since Mark Cox won Helsinki in 1977
- Won the doubles at Tel Aviv in 1989, Queen's Club in 1990 and Rotterdam in 1994
- Represented Great Britain in the Davis Cup from 1985-1995 and the European Cup from 1982-1993
- British National Singles Champion 1985, 1988, 1990 and 1992-1994; Doubles 1986, 1987, 1989-1991, 1993 and 1996
- Career prize money \$1.3 million
- Highest singles ranking 54 (17 April 1995) and doubles ranking 25 (4 March 1991)
- Retired after Wimbledon 1996 and became the Manager of Men's National Training at the Lawn Tennis Association. He was also Captain to the British Davis Cup team until he stepped down in July 2006.
- Married his wife, Ruth, on 28 August 1992 and they have a son, Joshua (born 27 January 1994) and Amy (born 15 August 1996)
- Enjoys most sport, computers, and spending time with his children
- Lives in Leatherhead, Surrey
