



ANDREW CASTLE

- Andrew Castle joined GMTV as one of its stable of presenters in September 200 after having presented the breakfast station's Wimbledon coverage for some years
- Born 15 November, 1963 in Epsom, Surrey, UK
- The former singles and doubles champion, he became a professional tennis player in 1986 and was the top ranked Briton in 1987 and 1991
- He represented Britain in the Davis Cup from 1986-1990, and the European Cup from 1987-1989
- A member of the UK's Olympic team in Seoul in 1988 and Barcelona in 1992
- Won 4 doubles titles on the ATP Tour at Seoul and Rye Brook in 1988, Adelaide in 1990 and Kuala Lumpur in 1991
- Was a Singles finalist in Seoul in 1988
- Reached the semi-finals in doubles at the Australian Open in 1988 and the quarter-finals at the US Open in 1990
- British National Singles Champion in 1987, 1989 and 1991; Doubles 1987 and 1989-1991
- Career prize money \$318,624
- Highest ATP singles ranking 80 (13 June, 1988) and ATP doubles ranking 45 (19 December, 1988)
- Graduated from Wichita State University with a Marketing Degree
- A former Sky Sports TV presenter, he has worked on tennis, golf and basketball covering such events as the PGA European Tour, the Ryder Cup and the NBA
- Now a well-known television personality who regularly appears as anchorman on GMTV's Breakfast Show. Also a commentator on the ATP Tour Magazine Show and other sports productions, he has hosted a phone-in on Radio Five Live called Andrew Castle's Tennis Night and last year narrated Flight of Death, a documentary for Channel 4
- Is a regular contributor to the Daily Telegraph and the Sunday Times
- Married wife Sophia on 18 May 1991 and they have two daughters, Georgina (born 11 December 1992) and Claudia (born 30 July 1994)
- Enjoys bungee jumping, observing the wildlife on Clapham Common, squash, golf and staying up too late
- Lives in Clapham, South London
