



PETER McNAMARA

- Born 5 July, 1955 in Melbourne, Australia
- Teamed with countryman Paul McNamee to form one of the world's leading doubles teams, winning the Australian Open in 1979 and Wimbledon in 1982
- Finished among the world's top teams in 1979, 1980 and 1981
- Won a total of 24 doubles titles during his 13 year career, including the WCT Doubles Championships in 1981
- Won 5 singles titles on the tour, including Berlin 1979, Brussels Outdoors in 1981, and Hamburg and the Melbourne Indoors in 1983
- Was a finalist 7 times, at Gstaad in 1979, Melbourne Indoors in 1980, and Frankfurt, Hamburg, Venice, Tokyo-indoor and WCT/Delray Beach in 1982
- Reached the singles semi-final at the Australian Open in 1980 and quarter-finals at Wimbledon in 1981
- Represented Australia in the Davis Cup, reaching the semi-finals for the fifth consecutive year in 1982
- Torn knee ligaments enforced a 21 month absence from the tour in 1982 and 1983 but he made a successful comeback
- Career prize money \$1.1 million
- Highest singles ranking 10 (in 1980 and 1981) and 4 in doubles (1980)
- Recorded wins over Jimmy Connors, Ivan Lendl, Yannick Noah, Tom Okker, Mats Wilander amongst others
- Was director of the National Tennis Centre in Melbourne before moving to England in 1996. Returned to coach for Tennis Australia in 2004.
- With his first wife, Kate, had a son, Justin (born 30 March 1980). Later married Isabelle and they have 2 children, daughter Rochelle (born 28 May 1986) and son Julian (born 15 March 1990)
- After living near Chiltern Green, Bedfordshire, he has relocated his family to Melbourne.
