



MARK PETCHEY

- Retired from full-time professional tennis in August 1998 to become a teaching pro and assisted several touring pros on the Sanex WTA Tour.
- Was appointed Manager of Men's National Training by the Lawn Tennis Association in September 2003, a position he held until 2005 when he became Andy Murray's coach.
- Began playing at the age of 8 when his father made him a special racket that he could lift easily. Together they won the Father-&-Son title in La Manga in 1986 and 1987.
- Won four singles and eight national junior titles and met with considerable success on the Challenger circuit, winning the events at Recife and Adelaide in 1993.
- Attained a career ranking of 80 in the world in 1994 and won the Beckenham tournament in 1996, beating Tim Henman and Petr Korda on the way.
- Career wins over Fernando Luna, Thomas Muster, Michael Stich, Michael Chang and Alberto Berasategui.
- Represented Britain in the Davis Cup from 1991 - 1996 as well as the European Cup in 1991, 92, 94 and 95.
- Is a much sought after commentator, working for Eurosport as a freelancer throughout the year and with the BBC Radio Five Live's Wimbledon coverage team.
- Originally from Essex, he now lives in Wimbledon.
